## Armed robbery

RCMP in Moncton say a Mountain Road convenience store was robbed at knifepoint Monday morning. It happened around 7:00. An employee was threatened but not hurt, and cash was stolen. The suspect is described as about 5'4", average build, with brown hair and a beard, and was wearing light-coloured pants and a red hooded jacket. Anyone with information is asked to contact Codiac RCMP or Crime Stoppers.

### Voyeurism sentencing

A 32-year-old Moncton man who pleaded guilty to five charges of voyeurism and one count of possesing child pornography has been sentenced to one year in jail. Jeffery Adam Amos has been given credit for time already served which means he has 8 months left to serve in jail. Amos was arrested last Winter following a four month investigation by the R-C-M-P's Internet Child Exploitation Unit that focused on a since-closed home daycare run by Amos' wife. Amos admitted to videotaping children as they used the bathroom.

#### Attempted murder

A Riverview man arrested on an attempted murder charge has been sent for a 30-day psychiatric assessment. Forty-eight-year-old Ron Wasser faces six charges in total. It's in connection with a shooting at a home on Kerry Court last week that put a 49-year-old woman in hospital. The accused returns to court on the afternoon of July second.

## Bus-death trial

Trial resumes later this week in Moncton for a man charged in a fatal buspedestrian collision in January of last year. Occuring at the corner of Main and King, a Codiac Transpo bus struck and killed Aurore LeBlanc, a 46-year-old woman from Memramcook. Charged with driving without due care and attention is 59-year-old Gary Pellerin. The Crown presented its case on Monday. It will be the defence's turn on Thursday.

#### Student lifesavers

Students at four area high schools are being taught some life-saving skills thanks to a partnership with the Advanced Coronary Treatment Foundation. Up to 800 students a year will be trained in CPR and how to use automated external defibrillators. The equipment is being donated by the Moncton Hospital and the teachers are being trained by New Brunswick Emergency Services. The use of CPR and defibrilators can improve the survival rate of Cardiac arrest victims by up to 75 per cent.
